# 1. Brief Answer

Yes — Scripture study should include **historical and archaeological evidence**, as long as:

- It confirms and does not contradict Torah,
- It strengthens **emunah** (faithfulness) and understanding of YAHUAH's works in real history,
- It is presented with humility, and labeled as witness or support, never as equal to the Word.

## 2. Primary Passages in Context

### Devarim (Deuteronomy) 32:7

"Remember the days of old, consider the years of many generations; ask your father, and he shall show you; your elders, and they shall tell you."

This command calls us to study the *historical record* — remembering YAHUAH's acts in time, not myth.

### Luqas (Luke) 1:1-3

"Since many have taken in hand to set in order an account of those matters which have been completed among us... it seemed good to me also, having accurately investigated all, to write to you in order, most excellent Theophilus..."

Luke openly describes an *investigative*, *historical method* to confirm what was witnessed.

Scripture itself models this approach — gathering testimony, facts, and events to confirm truth.

# 🔍 3. Confirming Cross-References

• **Tehillim (Psalms) 78:5–7** – "He established a testimony... that they might set their hope in Elohim, and not forget the works of El."

- Romans 15:4 "For whatever was written before was written for our learning, that through endurance and encouragement of the Scriptures we might have the expectation."
- Acts 17:11 The Bereans were called *noble* because they *searched* the Scriptures daily "testing" even apostolic teaching against the written record.

These verses affirm that investigation, evidence, and verification are righteous — as long as the **Torah remains the absolute standard.** 

## 4. Word Study

- "Remember" zakar (זְכַר, Strong's H2142): to recall, bring to mind, keep record.
- "Testimony" 'eduth (עדוּת, Strong's H5715): evidence, witness, or written record.
- "Investigated accurately" parakoloutheō (Gr. παρακολουθέω, Strong's G3877):
  to trace thoroughly, follow through logically.
- The very words of Scripture encourage careful examination of *records*, *witnesses*, *and tangible history*.

# 9 5. Historical & Archaeological Witness (Extra-Biblical, Tiered)

### A. Archaeological Witnesses (Torah-Aligned Support)

- **Tel Dan Stele** (9th c. BCE): Confirms the "House of David" (Beit Dawid).
- Lachish Letters (Jeremiah's era): Echo the siege and prophetic conditions of Yirmeyahu 34–39.
- **Dead Sea Scrolls** (1st c. BCE–1st c. CE): Preserve Torah and prophets nearly word-for-word proving the ancient text's reliability.
  - o e.g. 1QIsa (Isaiah Scroll) matches over 95% with Masoretic Isaiah.

#### **B. Cultural-Historical Context**

- Ancient Near Eastern covenant tablets mirror Deuteronomy's suzerain-vassal structure.
  - → This shows YAHUAH's covenant was historically rooted, not invented later.

• Egyptian and Assyrian records align with several Scriptural events (e.g., Sennacherib's siege of Yerushalayim, 2 Kings 18–19).

§ These evidences serve as witnesses — they confirm, not create, belief.

### **6. Common Errors**

False Practice	Torah Correction
Using archaeology to "prove" Scripture's truth.	Torah is true whether evidence is visible or not (Num 23:19).
Treating archaeology as equal authority.	Only Torah is the <i>final measure</i> (Deut 13:1–5).
Ignoring historical and linguistic context.	"Remember the days of old" (Deut 32:7). Context deepens revelation.

### 7. How to Present It Righteously

- 1. Always start with Scripture. Let Torah set the foundation.
- 2. Add evidence only as a servant to the text, not a master.
- 3. Label each as "historical witness" or "archaeological support," not "proof."
- Avoid speculative or sensational claims (e.g., unverified relics or myths).
- Close every study with application: "What does this call me to obey?"
